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Accessible Icon Project The Innovation
Collaborative is excited to announce the approval
of an accessibility project on campus! The
Accessible Icon project at Lynchburg is an
interdisciplinary, faculty-led community project
which will replace the traditional icon of disability

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Originating in Boston in 2010, the Accessible Icon Project is described by its creators, Brian Glenney and Sara Hendren, as "an ongoing work of design activism. It starts with a graphic icon, free for use in the public domain, and continues its work as a collaboration among people with disabilities and their allies toward a more accessible world." All of the accessible parking signage and accessible parking spaces on campus will be replaced with the new icon. Chelsea Tinklenberg and her Art 225 students will be working with Vector Space to design and create the large stencils used for repainting accessible spaces. Meghan McGuire's English 293W students will be helping paint the symbols on the parking spaces during a community event.

We will be hosting an event this spring where members of our community can participate in the changeover of the signage, including students, faculty, and staff who have disabilities and/or accessibility needs.

Our iRacing rigs have moved to Drysdale Student Center!

Two years ago, Dr. John "J" Salmon and the iRacing team DeltaSport donated an iRacing rig to the University. An iRacing rig is a seat for racing devices and includes racing wheels, shifters, pedals, and entire monitors. Racers use the iRacing software to connect to a network that organizes virtual races with participants across the globe. The IC is currently working on a booking process for the rig. Once that is in place, students will have open access to the rig in Pete's Place on the first floor of Drysdale. The project was made in collaboration with the University of Lynchburg, its professors and students, and Vector Space.

Rowing-Global Diversity Initiative (R-GDI)

We are excited to announce the approval of the first student-led project presented to the Innovation Collaborative and Executive Council. The Rowing-Global Diversity Initiative (R-GDI) Club, led by Kyle Thaller '25, a Westover Honors Fellow and Bonner Leader, requested the purchase of three erg-rowing machines to promote awareness and conversations around issues of global diversity (i.e. cultures, races, political affiliation, disabilities, religion, sexual identity, social justice, etc.) and promoting global citizenship.

Through the use of these rowing machines, flyers posted near the machines, and conversations among club members, they will promote collaboration and civil discourse among students, faculty, and staff. Kyle first presented the idea to the IC and once it was approved, he went on to present it to the Executive Council for final approval.

In this process, Vice President of Student Development Eric Baldwin proposed for Student Development to purchase one of the machines and the funding for the two remaining machines to come from the IC. All three machines will be located in the Drysdale Student Center. The machines will be purchased this semester and will be ready for use this summer.
