# Dell Thrift and Pantry has arrived!

On Monday, September 11th, Dell Thrift & Pantry (DT&P) had its grand opening. It seems to be a great success so far. There have been over 980 visits, resulting in distribution of 134 pounds of hygiene products and 485 pounds of food. It is more difficult to track outgoing clothes, although it is being restocked several times per week. We have also collected clothing from both on and off campus partners and remain in need of male clothes.



The IC provided the initial funding for setting up Dell Thrift & Pantry to purchase shelving, clothes racks, collection boxes, signage and more. In collaboration with the Spiritual Life Center, Center for Community Engagement and Park View Community Mission's Food for Thought Program, food is picked up once a week that is shared between the Free Little Pantry outside of Spiritual Life and DT&P. There are also students with LESS (Lynchburg



Environmental Sustainability Society) and Bonner Leaders that are assisting with washing and sorting clothes. Students and staff from a variety of departments within Student Development are checking on the space to make sure that it remains clean and straightened.

As this is the first semester of having DT&P, the use of the space and types of items will be tracked to give a better understanding of the needs. We will also be evaluating sustainability practices and will encourage others to collaborate and assist with these needs.



# Artist statement by student sculptor Isaiah Romsdahl:

"The Hive" really stands for much more than anything we ever prescribed to the sculpture. Throughout the entire process, there was an incredible amount of unity felt throughout this team, and this concept was visualized at its base, where three hex-pods rest together, carrying the others. On the other hand, there was also this sense that we were united in spite of our differences everyone involved came from a different background, had a different aesthetic, and had a different vision for what the piece would look like if they were the only one putting their name on it. This unspoken sentiment was visualized not only through the orientation of the hex-pods furthest left and above, but through the colors chosen to be displayed on either side of "The Hive." This piece is a celebration of differences and a recognition that together we can accomplish so much more than we would individually."
