
Paul Waibel '68

Gail Aveson B.A. '73, M.Ed. '74

Article on Gail Aveson from 2018: Gail will be in concert on Sunday November 18 at 3:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary of St. Mark's United Methodist Church in Easton for her 50th Anniversary Concert. Aveson, a familiar voice on the Eastern Shore began her solo singing career at St. Mark's during the summer of 1968 accompanied by then dental student Mark Higginbottom. She became a soloist with the Swarthmore High School Choir, the Swarthmore Methodist Episcopal Church Choir, Lynchburg Concert Choir and Madrigal Group and the Choir at Historic Christ Church (Episcopal) in Irvington, Virginia. Gail has been a soloist for most of the churches in the Easton/Oxford/St. Michaels area over the years.

On the stage, she has performed with the Colonel Richardson Players, The Skipjack Players, Easton High School and the Tred Avon Players. She has been a soloist with Miles

River Musicales, Abendmusiken and the Easton Choral Arts Society. A charter member of the Heart and Music Cast, Gail has performed in all eight shows.

Several highlights of her career have been the solo concerts she sang to benefit the Avalon and her three solo concerts at Chesapeake College for the scholarship fund.

Gail has sung as far south as Florida, as far west as Chicago and as far north as Philadelphia.

Her teachers include Evelyn Whitmore Smith (Swarthmore College), Dr. Robert Ellinwood (Lynchburg College), Norman Heyde (Salisbury University), Dr. William Wharton (Chesapeake College), David Price (Wilmington), Susan Chadwick (Baltimore) and Melissa Bidlack Towson).

Songs in the concert include her very first solo again accompanied by Dr. Mark Higginbottom, *O Mio Babbino Caro*, *Steal Me* from Menotti's *Old Maid and the Thief* as well as two contemporary duets: *Never/Easy* (Closer Than Ever) with soprano, Debra Smith and *I'd Give it All for You* (Songs for a New World) with Joe Tyler. Also accompanying is Gail's longtime friend and organist at St. Mark's, Dr. William Wharton.

Gail has been teaching voice for 20 years. Her students range in age from 6 to 80. A retired school counselor, she is also on the adjunct faculty at Wilmington University and is a Licensed Professional Counselor.
