Westover Alumni News

Bev Jordan '52

I was to finish E.C. Glass High School in June of 1945. After another year and two summer schools later, I finally made it out at close to the bottom of my class in June of 1946. Two of my friends and I decided to join the Marine Corps for a two year hitch. It was an adventure and the G.I bill was in effect until the official end of WWll which was December 1946. At that time, I had no other plans, and I sure could not qualify with my grades or even afford to go to college. Quite early on in the first week of boot camp in the Corps, I learned a very valuable lesson. I for sure, had screwed up in high school with three failures in Latin, two in algebra, among others, as well as barely passing

grades in the subjects that I liked, such as history and literature. I quickly saw the difference in the men with bars and stars on their shoulders and those with a stripe or two on their sleeves. It was then that I vowed to go to college when I was discharged, that is, if I could even get into a college. I promised myself that my future would be like the guys with bars and stars.

After my discharge from active duty in the late spring of 1948, I went over to the admissions office of Lynchburg College, hoping to sign up as a freshman for the fall of 1948. I figured that all summer I could play around, shoot pool, look up some old girl friends and go to Virginia Beach. My plans were torpedoed. I was told that with my high school grades I would have to go to summer school just to see if I was college material...wow, what a let down! To this day I believe that the only reason that admissions allowed me to enter LC was because I was a veteran.

I was assigned two classes to attend. I fail to remember one of the class subjects, but no matter, what counts is the one I remember well. I was to be in the class of freshman English, taught by Laura Jeter Parker. This was truly a turning point in my life. Ms. Parker was the greatest teacher that I had ever encountered. The primary thing that she taught me was how to really study. She made English become one of my favorite subjects. I made a "B" the first semester of summer school and an "A" the second and her reputation was one of the hardest teachers at LC. She saved my future!

I chose economics as my major. Again I had a great teacher, Dr. Bronislaw E. Matecki. Dr. Matecki was Polish and served on Great Britain's Economic board during WWII. He too, was a no non-sense teacher. My schooling was interrupted on July 29, 1950. I was in the Marine Corps reserve and was called into active duty because of the Korean conflict. Fortunately I was not sent to Korea and returned to LC in the fall of 1951. I had even more G.I bill credits toward college now. I did well in economics. I went to classes winter and summer and worked as a sales person in the men's department of J.R. Milner Department store as well, about twenty-five or so hours a week, and I studied like Laura Jeter Parker had taught me to do so well. In addition I got married in December of 1950 while home on leave. My hours were filled! I studied hard....I remembered Parris Island and my promise to myself. With less than twenty scholastic hours needed for my degree in the fall of 1951, I took every economics class that was offered and more on the side that Dr. Matecki gave me. I finished with many more hours than required for my degree and was in the top ten per cent of my economics class. Still, like high school, I finished a year and many summer schools later after I was supposed to graduate, in the spring of 1951. Thank you U.S. Marine Corps, and especially you, Laura Jeter Parker, and thank you Lynchburg College for giving me that opportunity so many years ago.


Thomas A. Tunstall '60



Dorothy Bundy Turner Potter '64

From September 15 to September 21, Clifton Potter '62 and Dorothy Bundy Turner Potter '64 were part of a tour group which visited numerous World War I battlefields, museums, and monuments in France and Belgium. This tour was organized by the 116th Infantry Regiment Foundation (Virginia National Guard), as part as the hundredth year commemoration of the end of the so-called "War to End all Wars,"

(November 11, 1918). Focusing in particular on American cemeteries and monuments, the Potters, their son Edmund, who was one of the tour leaders, and their grandson Landon, visited the Cloth Hall Museum in Ypes Belgium, Belleau Wood, St. Mihiel, Verdun, the Meuse-Argonne, and other French sites, making particular efforts to locate and mark graves of American soldiers from central Virginia. Other activities included walking through still-extant German trenches which had been built well enough for tourists to invade, a two-night stay at a nineteenth century chateau, and a day in Paris, which included a visit to the monument of the famed Lafayette Escadrille (photo), as well as the tomb of Napoleon I and adjoining museum. There was also still time for shopping.
